

In Mark 10:46-52, we encounter the touching story of Blind Bartimaeus encountering Jesus on the road to Jericho. Bartimaeus, a blind beggar, hears that Jesus of Nazareth is passing by. In desperation, he cries out, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" (Mark 10:47). Despite the crowd's attempts to silence him, Bartimaeus persists, recognizing Jesus not only as a healer but as the promised Messiah.

Jesus hears Bartimaeus' cry and stops. He calls Bartimaeus to him and asks, "What do you want me to do for you?" (Mark 10:51). Bartimaeus responds, "Rabbi, I want to see." (Mark 10:51). Jesus commends Bartimaeus' faith, saying, "Go, your faith has healed you." (Mark 10:52). Instantly, Bartimaeus receives his sight. This same Jesus is still healing today – both spiritual and physically!

Join us this Sunday as we learn important lessons of faith from the New Testament account of Blind Bartimaeus.

#### Lessons From Bartimaeus

Bartimaeus was blind, marginalized, and a beggar—situations that signify helplessness and total dependence on others. His persistent shouting for Jesus, even when others rebuked him, highlights his determination and unwavering faith.

Despite his physical blindness, Bartimaeus had spiritual insight recognizing Jesus as the "Son of David," a messianic title. By calling Jesus "Son of David," Bartimaeus acknowledged Jesus as the promised Messiah. This title reflects his belief in Jesus' divine authority and power to heal.

Initially, the crowd rebukes Bartimaeus, reflecting societal attitudes toward marginalized individuals. However, when Jesus calls for Bartimaeus, the crowd's attitude shifts, indicating how Jesus' actions influence social perceptions and attitudes.

Jesus stops and acknowledges Bartimaeus, showing His compassion and willingness to meet individual needs amidst a large following. By asking, "What do you want me to do for you?" Jesus gives Bartimaeus the opportunity to express his faith and specific desire for healing.

Bartimaeus's response, "Rabbi, I want to see," signifies his faith in Jesus' ability to restore his sight. His faith is pivotal, as Jesus affirms, "Your faith has healed you." Upon receiving his sight, Bartimaeus follows Jesus, symbolizing discipleship and the transformative power of encountering Christ. His immediate decision to follow Jesus highlights the call to discipleship that follows experiencing Jesus' grace and power.

The story of Blind Bartimaeus is a powerful testament to the transformative power of faith in Jesus. It challenges us to persist in our faith, recognize our need for Jesus, and respond to His call with readiness and commitment. May we, like Bartimaeus, experience Jesus' healing and follow Him faithfully along the road of discipleship.

#### Have A Listening Spirit

"For by wise guidance you will wage war, and in abundance of counselors there is victory." – Proverbs 24:6

Seeking advice is an important, yet difficult, habit to cultivate. It requires humility and admitting that we might be wrong. We need to admit that we don't have all the answers and that we need help.

We often actively approach people we respect for advice. But we can also approach people we normally would not seek out, those we might not feel have anything important to say, those who have not helped us in the past, or even people we find irritating or spiritually immature — even novices (Psalm 8:2). Sometimes observations and opinions are given without our consent or request.

As the Bible tells us, there is victory "in abundance of counselors" and listening to the perspective of many people. It's possible to gain some important insights from anyone, regardless of their background or our past relationships, even if they're not 100% correct.


This process also requires sensitivity and discernment. It is impractical and foolish to accept the advice of everyone. We need to develop the right attitude and not be proud or self-centered but humble, willing to listen. In that spirit, we become more sensitive to God's leading, correction, and guidance.

We always must be careful to check every opinion and recommendation against the Bible to be sure our decisions are consistent with the Word. We need to pray about every situation and be sensitive to the Spirit and His leading.

"Father, I humble myself before You. Help me be a good listener. Give me discernment. In Jesus' name, Amen!"


#### "The Monkey & The Zoo Keeper... The Last Impression!

#### **Break Our Hearts O God!**

I want to believe that a lot of Christians at some point have prayed the prayer: "Lord, break my heart for what breaks yours." We've asked God to give us the eyes to see his children the way he does and the heart to love them as he does. We've asked God to give us his heart for people.

This is an honest, good prayer. Our desire should be to serve and love our brothers and sisters in Christ, and those who have rejected the faith, because we have the Holy Spirit living in us, which should result in a change of heart and mind. In Ezekiel 36:26, it says "I will give you a new heart and put a new spirit in you; I will remove from you your heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh."

But what breaks God's heart? And, are we really ready to have our hearts broken in the same ways and for the same things as God? What does it mean to pray a prayer like that?

God's heart breaks for all of his children. It breaks for those who have loved him their whole lives and for those who've never known him. It breaks for injustice and oppression. It breaks for the sin, disease, loss, grief, pain, confusion, and struggle of his children and of this world. God's heart breaks for those who are in him, struggling to accept grace or to repent. It breaks for the ways his own creation rejects him.

In a world as broken, sinful, and as hurt as ours, God's heart breaks every day for so many things. Because if God is love, then he is constantly being rejected, abused, hurt, and broken. So, if we ask God to really break our hearts for what breaks his, we are going to experience a lot of intense, vulnerable realities. We will glimpse the depth of our sin and how it breaks God's heart. We will experience broken circumstances and broken people. We will see situations where hope seems non-existent, and God seems far. We will endure hardships and we will grieve with others.

Asking God to break our hearts for what breaks his will convict us because we break his heart. Our sin, our rejection of him, breaks his heart. However, if we are in Christ, our sin does not condemn us. We have grace, we are covered by the blood of Christ, and we do not have to be and cannot ever be perfect. But our sin still hurts God because it is an act of rejection and rebellion against him and it results in our pain or the pain of others. If our heart breaks for what God's does, then we will experience the sweet heartbreak of conviction.

If our hearts break for what God's does, we will mourn, we will grieve, we will writhe in the pain of others, we will be convicted. But, we will also see how our Father heals, restores, and renews the broken. We will see the heart of God.
