Undaunted, they climbed up to the top of the house, dug through the roof, and lowered their friend down to Jesus. Their expectation led to action and resulted in a miracle!

When Jesus Sees the Faith of Friends...

In the bustling town of Capernaum, news spread quickly that Jesus was at home. People flocked to see Him, filling the house to capacity and spilling out the doors. Amidst this crowd, a group of friends carried their paralyzed companion on a mat. Their determination to reach Jesus was unwavering, but the throng of people made entry impossible.

Undeterred, they climbed onto the roof, made an opening, and lowered their friend down to where Jesus was teaching. This powerful scene illustrates several profound truths about faith, community, and the transformative power of Jesus. By studying some of the details we too can learn better to operate in faith as God intemded for us.

The friends' faith was not passive; it was active and persistent. They encountered significant barriers but refused to let them hinder their mission. Their actions speak volumes about the nature of true faith. Faith is not merely a mental assent to certain truths; it is a driving force that moves us to action, even in the face of daunting obstacles.

The paralyzed man's healing was a collective effort. His friends' determination and faith were instrumental in his miracle. This story emphasizes the importance of community and interdependence. In our spiritual journey, we often need the support, faith, and encouragement of others. Likewise, we are called to bear one another's burdens and be instruments of God's grace and healing in each other's lives. Each one of us is a piece in God's grand puzzle of life.

When Jesus saw the paralyzed man being lowered through the roof, He saw beyond the physical act. He perceived the faith of the friends and the deep desire for healing. Jesus' response to their faith was immediate and profound: "Son, your sins are for given." Before addressing the physical ailment, Jesus addressed the man's deeper spiritual need. This reminds us that Jesus sees the heart and understands our deepest needs, even those we might not voice or recognize ourselves.

Jesus' authority is vividly displayed as He addresses both the spiritual and physical condition of the paralyzed man. By forgiving his sins and commanding him to rise, take up his mat, and walk, Jesus demonstrates His power to bring complete healing and wholeness. This healing illustrates that Jesus' mission includes both the restoration of bodies and the reconciliation of our souls to God.


Community Dinner, Friday, July 26th

Being Christ-like In Today's Culture...

Does today's anti-Christian rhetoric make you mad? Ever get so fed up you'd like to give someone a piece of your mind? Christians have a message worth dying for. We have standards and convictions that place us at odds with our culture. But how can we be wise as serpents and as harmless as doves? How can we maintain our Christian composure in a confrontational age?

We can learn from Jesus. He was never weak, but never rude. He spoke clearly and confidently, yet without venom

or virulence. The apostle Peter, sometimes a loose cannon, learned that lesson well. 1 Peter tells us to walk in His steps, to deal with opposition as Christ did.

Speak Up – Respectfully - That means speaking up when needed. Peter told us to "proclaim the praises of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light" (1 Peter 2:9. But Peter also reminded us to present our defense of the faith "with meekness and fear, having a good conscience, that when they defame you as evildoers, those who revile your good conduct in Christ may be ashamed" (3:15-16). He warned us about grumbling (4:9) and to be submissive to governing authorities (2:13-14).

Know When to Keep Quiet - We can also learn from Jesus the fine art of keeping quiet. By example Jesus taught us that sometimes a closed mouth offers the loudest testimony. Our Lord's majestic silence still evokes dignity as we read of Him standing before Herod, Pilate, and the Sanhedrin, offering not a word of despair or defense. It was undoubtedly the glow on Stephen's face and his words of forgiveness that haunted the young Saul of Tarsus until he became Paul the apostle.

Let Your Good Works Speak for Themselves - Finally, we find peace amid the conflict when we let our good works speak for themselves. The world has a hard time finding fault in good works. When we feed the hungry, care for the unfortunate, adopt orphans, provide relief, and live out our faith, they are silenced.

As Christians, we must confront our culture and speak the truth in love. We're God's ambassadors in a hostile world. This is no time to go mute. Morals are spiraling downward, marriage is being attacked, the church is being marginalized, atheists are scorning the truth, and humanists are relentlessly advancing an ungodly agenda on a new generation. We have to speak up.

But we must do so as Christ did—and He was never ill-tempered, hot-headed, loose -lipped, or bad humored. We have to watch ourselves because the whole world is watching us; and when others see us, we want them to see Him.



It Is Uncomfortable Following Jesus

If you aren't uncomfortable in your faith, you may not be following Jesus. Just consider those encountering Jesus when he was on his way to die.

Along the way, Jesus was met by a rich young man who asked how he could get into heaven. Jesus told him to sell everything and give his money to the poor because it is easier for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to get into heaven. This

teaching from Jesus was so radical that the disciples were left wondering who in the world could be saved. While they were still reeling from this, Jesus "comforted" them by saying,

"Truly, I say to you, there is no one who has left house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or lands for my sake and for the gospel, who will not receive a hundredfold now in this time, houses and brothers and sisters and children and lands, with persecutions, and in the age to come eternal life. But many who are first will be last, and the last first." Luke 18:29

Do Jesus' teachings make you comfortable? If so, then you probably haven't heard all of his teaching. You might have read them or heard them preached, but somehow, you haven't really heard them.

Jesus was revolutionary. He shook his followers from their comfort, and he spoke against many of their pre-conceived notions about what it meant to be his follower and a true child of God.

Jesus came to seek and save the lost, but he didn't come to make you comfortable. He came to love you, but he didn't come to make you comfortable. In fact, until you are profoundly uncomfortable you probably can't experience the totality of God's love and grace and you can't lead others to experience Christ in his fullness.

If we are never challenged by God's word, we aren't reading all of God's word. And, if we are never uncomfortable with Jesus, we may not be following Jesus at all, but a savior of our own comfortable imagination.

As we journey daily in the walk of true discipleship, let us be reminded that a comfortable God is no God at all. Change only comes through challenge, and the God who can overcame death, hell, and the grave, didn't do so to leave the world unchanged. He came to set the world right and he gave his own life to accomplish that purpose.

Let's continue to grow comfortable in discomfort and truly committed to follow Jesus wherever he might lead!
